


IT'S BETWEEN JULIAN AND THE TORIES IN PORTHILL

COMPUTERS FOR KIDS' RECYCLING SUCCESS

Over 40 computers refurbished for home schooling children! In January I began collecting second-hand laptops and tablets to recycle for home learning. After publicity on social media and Shropshire Radio many local people have generously donated their older devices. The 'GoToFixIt' team have prepared these and St George's School has distributed them to families who were struggling, often with parents and

ROAD SAFETY SUCCESS - BASED ON YOUR VIEWS

Julian listened to your views on road safety issues locally. Here are some of the things he's been able to do to help make local streets safer:

- One way traffic in New Street allowing better pedestrian safety
- 20mph limits in neighbouring streets including a section of Copthorne Road
- Further measures to improve Copthorne Road expected
- Cycle lane between Copthorne Road and the Boat House



The pavement in the narrow part of New Street has been a danger for many years. It is used by residents, parents with buggies, children and visitors to the Quarry. Over the years, as cars have got bigger, the danger of being clipped by wing mirrors has increased. When I was first elected in 2017, I discovered plans for a one-way scheme had been drawn up but hadn't been followed through. I carried out a survey in the area which showed support for the scheme, so long as neighbouring streets were also considered. Working with residents I distributed '20's plenty' stickers for the area. Council staff agreed to try out the one-way scheme once disruption from the Copthorne Keep development had ended.



Then Covid happened! It was sensible to bring in the scheme to support social distancing and run this as the trial. Together with council staff I put together a further consultation. Paper copies went to residents in local homes. People from the whole area could respond online. I am very pleased that 261 people took part. The final plan will be based on your responses.

No single scheme will stop all traffic problems, but I am especially pleased that a 20mph limit is planned for the first part of Copthorne Road as well as New Street, Pengwern Road and some other residential streets.

CAN SHREWSBURY COPE WITH MORE DEVELOPMENT?

Shropshire Council will soon vote on a the new 'Local Plan'. This will decide where further housing development can go. I believe it includes far too many new edge-of-town developments. The rules for new homes on energy, transport and green space are not tough enough. In 2019 I worked with others to put forward many ideas for a better plan. Most of these recommendations were rejected and I will therefore be opposing the final plan. Sadly, I was alone in voting against it in the Town Council in February.

We do need affordable homes, but there is space within the town for enough with access to shops, trains and services which will not need car journeys. The 'Big Town Plan' has good ideas for this, and I will continue to support many of its suggestions.

EXTRA CROSSING ON COPTHORNE ROAD?

Looking ahead, I am pushing for an extra crossing on Copthorne Road (this is being considered) and I am working with others to cut through-traffic in the town centre. This will mean less traffic in the whole Copthorne Road area.

PLEASE SIGN OUR PETITION!

20mph limits make streets safer and more welcoming for all. More people will choose to walk, cycle and scooter, improving health and our environment. Bolton & Brighton, Wigan & Westminster - *and the whole of Wales* - have adopted '20's plenty' - 20mph default limits in residential streets. So far Shropshire has 20mph limits in some villages, outside some schools and in some town centre streets only. Come on Shropshire Council, we are ready for 20! We call on Shropshire Council to replace 30mph with 20mph as the default limit in residential streets.

THREE YEARS AGO...SPRING 2018

ACCESS IMPROVEMENTS MADE AT PENGROVE
Good News: A dropped kerb and new bicycle gate have been put in place at Pengrove. This will allow mobility scooters and prams to get on to the riverside path.

After a resident contacted me I arranged for these improvements to be made, with financial help from the Inclusively Fit Project as well as Shropshire Council. I will now be seeking funding to improve the whole path as it still has many hazards for mobility scooter users and those with pushchairs.

ICY PAVEMENTS SHOULD HAVE BEEN CLEARED, SAYS JULIAN
Clearing the roads for traffic is important, but pedestrians have rights too. Pavements should have been cleared.

Many of you were rightly concerned that pavements were not safe during the recent icy and snowy weather. There were many accidents and injuries. Even the main highways and pavements around the town were hazardous.

BIG TOWN WALK - 18TH MAY
I am excited to have helped organise Shrewsbury's first Big Town Walks event. These give residents a way to discover new green areas around town. We have four walking routes ready this year and hope to have more in the future.

We had a group of children kindly give up their old toys and books, starting from the Bricklayers Arms.

Hedges: I have been contacted recently about a few garden hedges. With longer growing seasons due to climate change there is more risk that hedges will make life difficult for people passing by on pavements. Please be mindful of this by keeping hedges under control.

Package: I bring in much of our area. We can all help by parking thoughtfully, and reminding others, politely, that pedestrians shouldn't be forced into the road, and that streets need to be clear for emergency vehicles.

ONE YEAR AGO...SPRING 2020

JULIAN HELPS PLANT 2000 TREES IN SHREWSBURY
In early February Julian and other local residents went over to Morkmoor Recreation Ground to help Shrewsbury Town Council plant 2000 trees.

Julian said, "we know that trees can make a big difference in improving air quality, preventing flash flooding and capturing CO₂ - the main source of global heating. Unfortunately we have lost some roadside trees in recent years, which can make a special contribution in reducing air pollution."

I am continuing to campaign for a 'Activated Sign' and a 20mph limit in the area.

Since becoming your councillor Julian has pushed for action on the climate emergency in Shrewsbury and Shropshire. He has now been given a role to support Green Party councillors across the country on this.
