
IT'S BETWEEN JULIAN AND THE TORIES IN PORTHILL

COMPUTERS FOR KIDS' RECYCLING SUCCESS

Over 40 computers refurbished for home schooling children! In January I began collecting secondhand laptops and tablets to recycle for home learning. After publicity on social media and Shropshire Radio many local people have generously donated their older devices. The 'GoToFixIt' team have prepared these and St George's School has distributed them to families who were struggling, often with parents and

children all needing to work from home.

So far over 40 devices have been brought back to life. I have secured funds from the Town Council for some spare parts. A big Thank You goes to both Mike from GoToFixIt and to those of you who donated. At the time of writing we are looking to expand the scheme for other uses.

ROAD SAFETY SUCCESS - BASED ON YOUR VIEWS

Julian listened to your views on road safety issues locally. Here are some of the things he's been able to do to help make local streets safer:

- One way traffic in New Street allowing better pedestrian safety
- 20mph limits in neighbouring streets including a section of Copthorne Road
- Further measures to improve Copthorne Road expected
- Cycle lane between Copthorne Road and the Boat House

The pavement in the narrow part of New Street has been a danger for many years. It is used by residents, parents with buggies, children and visitors to the Quarry. Over the years, as cars have got bigger, the danger of being clipped by wing mirrors has increased. When I was first elected in 2017, I discovered plans for a one-way scheme had been drawn up but hadn't been followed through. I carried out a survey in the area which showed support for the scheme, so long as neighbouring streets were also considered. Working with residents I distributed '20's plenty' stickers for the area. Council staff agreed to try out the one-way scheme once disruption from the Copthorne Keep development had ended.



Then Covid happened! It was sensible to bring in the scheme to support social distancing and run this as the trial. Together with council staff I put together a further consultation. Paper copies went to residents in local homes. People from the whole area could respond online. I am very pleased that 261 people took part. The final plan will be based on your responses.

20's Plenty

No single scheme will stop all traffic problems, but I am especially pleased that a 20mph limit is planned for the first part of Copthorne Road as well as New Street, Pengwern Road and some other residential streets.

PLEASE SIGN OUR PETITION! **EXTRA CROSSING ON COPTHORNE ROAD?**

Looking ahead, I am pushing for an extra crossing on Copthorne Road (this is being considered) and I am working with others to cut through-traffic in the town centre. This will mean less traffic in the whole Copthorne Road area.




20mph limits make streets safer and more welcoming for all. More people will choose to walk, cycle and scooter, improving health and our environment. Bolton & Brighton, Wigan & Westminster - and the whole of Wales - have adopted '20's plenty' - 20mph default limits in residential streets. So far Shropshire has 20mph limits in some villages, outside some schools and in some town centre streets only. Come on Shropshire Council, we are ready for 20! We call on Shropshire Council to replace 30mph with 20mph as the default limit in residential streets.

believe it includes far too many new edge-of-town developments. The rules for new homes on energy, transport and green space are not tough enough. In 2019 I worked with others to put forward many ideas for a better plan. Most of these recommendations were rejected and I will therefore be opposing the final plan. Sadly, I was alone in voting against it in the Town Council in February.

We do need affordable homes, but there is space within the town for enough with access to shops, trains and services which will not need car journeys. The 'Big Town Plan' has good ideas for this, and I will continue to support many of its suggestions.
