ROAD SAFETY - A MISSED OPPORTUNITY?

Residents on Ridgebourne Road recently told us that Shropshire Council plans to put in new "advisory cycle lanes" along their road. We held a distanced meeting in the street (photo below) and agree with the residents that this would be a waste of money and paint that would do nothing to make cycling in that area safer and easier. What is really needed is to improve the shared walking and cycling track on Roman Road for the hundreds of young people who use it every day to get to and from school.



The latest government advice to councils is to give more space for cycling to help with social distancing, increase the general health of

the population and to reduce traffic congestion. Shropshire Council will have received funding for this.

So far, we have seen little sign that Shropshire Council is taking this advice seriously. Together with local residents we are challenging them to scrap their weak proposals and to come up with a more ambitious and effective plan.

NEW RIVER TEAM IN ACTION



Many thanks to everyone who turned out to help with our sociallydistanced litter pick at Rad Valley Gardens on 6th September. Nineteen local

people aged from under-10 to over-80 joined us to collect **12 full bags of rubbish**, plus some larger items which had ended up in the brook. UPDATE ON PRIMARY SCHOOL PLACES

In our last newsletter we highlighted a front-page report in the Shropshire Star (July 20th 2020) regarding a shortage of primary school places in Radbrook and Bowbrook Meadows. The Star quoted a report to the local authority stating,

"...schools surrounding the Bowbrook area are consistently filled to the infant class size capacity at the point of entry.

There are usually no vacancies for pupils moving into the area."

Builders of new developments can and should be required to put some of their profits into creating the public services needed for all the new residents. If not, one knock-on effect is that families have to settle for school places outside the area.

We have submitted a Freedom of Information request to Shropshire Council to discover exactly how over-subscribed local schools are, and will be pressing for the desperately needed new school between Hanwood Road and Mytton Oak Road to be prioritised at the earliest opportunity.

We will also be responding to Shropshire Council's consultation on their Local Plan and stressing that new housing developments have to come with added local school capacity and other services including public transport.

BOWBROOK MEADOWS TREES NEGLECTED BY DEVELOPERS

During the hot spell this summer we were saddened to see that a large number of recently-planted trees on the new Bowbrook Meadows development were 'distressed' or already dead. Despite the Government's recent announcement to make all roads in new developments tree -lined, a walk along Squinter Pip Way revealed **dozens of dead or dying trees** as a result of poor planting or poor aftercare.

Trees are vital for human wellbeing and for wildlife.

Developers at sites like Bowbrook Meadows are required to plant trees to replace wildlife areas lost to development and to help deal with climate change. **These are empty promises** if the trees die for lack of care.

We are investigating what can be done to ensure the trees at Bowbrook Meadows that have died are replaced by the developers and cared for properly.
